
Saturday 22 April 9am to 1pm

I have noticed the lack of insects in my garden, except for many dragon flies over the last month or so. I now have one less as my pot of sundews has claimed a victim.

Ed Note: Maybe Karen's talk will encourage us to do our bit to reverse this trend.

Aussie Plants Beside the Seaside

Brian Roach presented a most interesting challenge to the meeting when he discussed both *Ceratopetalum gum-miferum* (NSW Christmas Bush) and *Banksia vincentia* and raised the question of to what extent do seaside

conditions such as wind and salt spray possibly change the genetics of a plant.

Brian first encountered the dwarf form of *Ceratopetalum gummiferum* in 1983. Just prior to then it was found in Evans Head near Chinamen's Beach. Brian has since studied it and propagated it vegetatively and in 2004 registered it as Ceratopetalum Johanna's Christmas Bush: https://

From the initial cuttings only 3/50 cuttings survived. Persistence, and trial and error, paid off and today this dwarf variety is available from many sources. Brian commented that this form needs to be kept moist when grown in pots. It does not have a lignotuber. It tolerates all fertilisers. In the ground, once established, it needs no extra care or watering.



Last year, through a chance encounter while in the country, Brian rekindled his quest to find the original plants at Evans Head. Then by chatting with locals at Evans Head he was able to revisit the area and found two specimens. One was about 2.5m high x 6m wide- very different from the characteristic growth of *C.gummiferum* in other areas, including in the Hornsby area. https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Ceratopetalum_gummiferum

The beach area was heavily mined for rutile in the early 1970s and Brian thinks that this plant was one of the few to survive. Brian also commented that with GPS coordinates now able to be readily recorded, finding plants again is much easier than the serendipitous method he used.

Austromyrtus dulcis (Midgen Berry) https://www.anbg.gov.au/gnp/gnp12/austromyrtus-dulcis.html is growing in abundance at the same location at Evans Head.

The other plant that was discussed is *Banksia vincentia* that was first identified as a dwarf banksia species in 2010. It only grows to about 80cm high and is propagated from cuttings. This is fortunate as only 6 individual plants are known to be in the wild. Discussion is ongoing as to whether this is a dwarf form of *Banksia spinulosa*.

- We can't 'read' patterns in the mosaic but there is intricate and beautiful variation.
