Conservation in Ku-ring-gai Council (KC) area A talk by Jacob Sife

The July meeting was treated to a most informative and interesting talk about what is happening in the KC area in the field of conservation. Jacob main message was **COLLABORATION** between individuals, government agencies, public groups and organisations to achieve positive outcomes.

Ku-ring-gai area is still an area with a high level of biodiversity: including the Blue Gum High Forest, sightings of the Pacific Baza Hawk (*Aviceda subcristata*), Eastern Pygmy Possums (*Cercartetus nanus*), several varieties of frogs and plants, including the native orchid, *Genoplesium baueri*.

Conservation is conducted on different levels: landscape scale (State and local planning including NSW Department of Planning, Industry and Environment and Office of Environment and Heritage), Reserve scale and species &/or site scale.

The conservation work is largely funded by the 5% levy rates in KC.

Jacob commented that awareness, inspiration and community engagement are essential for successful conservation. This work can be resource intensive- financial, personnel, time and materials. Citizen Science and volunteer contributions are very important. Jacob then briefly outlined a few projects being carried out in KC.

Microbats: these are insectivorous small bats. One of these bats, the fishing bat Large-footed Myotis (*Myotis Macropus*), flies low over water bodies to collect their food. The studies looked at activity of these small bats over various water bodies- creeks, pools retrofitted as natural ponds, normal pools, dams, sediment ponds and those on golf courses. It has been established that different micro bat and macrobats species are habitat specific. The study showed that the golf course ponds were popular.

Grey Headed Flying Fox (*Pteropus poliocephalus*) live in camps that are loud and smelly. They live in very mobile populations along the eastern coast. Collaboration with many groups is required- bushcare, local residents, citizen science groups collecting research data, community groups such as schools, local and state government bodies. One initiative to aid the conservation of this species has been the provision of double glazing for local residents to dampen any noise from the bats.

Eastern Pygmy Possum (*cercartetus nanus*): Citizen scientists have assisted greatly with this study with activities such as checking nest boxes. *Banksia ericifolia* is an excellent food source. (An Eastern Pygmy Possum was seen in June 2017 on one of the APS NSG W&T walks at Ku-ring-gai Wildflower Gardens).

Foxes: (*Vulpes vulpes*). In collaboration with National Parks and Wildlife Service NSW baiting stations are used to try and control fox populations. Jacob commented that fire actually increases the damage that foxes and cats inflict on native wildlife as these species are comfortable in the burnt areas and the surviving native animals have less protection in the burnt bush.

If you wish to contribute to sightings of feral animals please contact https://www.feralscan.org.au. Note that this site is for the collection of data. It does not mean that any active action will occur as a result of the reporting, but by getting a better understanding of the problem, then effective strategies may be able to be developed.

Hibbertia spanantha (Julian's Hibbertia) was first discovered locally in 2007 and named in 2015. Conservation scientists are studying this plant. It has been discovered that burning seems to be an important requirement for reproduction. In collaboration with Hornsby Shire Nursery an attempt is being made to propagate from seed with the 3 seeds that are available. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=haQzeEzl7ng

Genoplesium bauera: This is a threatened native orchid which is found in KWG and has been studied over many years by APS NSG member, Wendy Grimm. Save our Species funding has supported various studies of this plant.

A short Q&A session was held. Jacob commented that ecological fires are usually smaller and very targeted to have a specific outcome, while hazard reduction burns are primarily for safety reasons but may also have ecological benefits.

Concluding, Jacob reinforced the concept of successful collaboration being essential for conservation work. Hopefully, increasing an appreciation of the natural environment will also be an outcome of all these various projects.

Jacob is currently the Natural Areas Program Leader, Ku-ring-gai Council.

Propagation





The trolley takes up to 70 kg and does not need items to be lifted up and over as with a wheelbarrow. Just tilt the trolley forward to load and unload it. It is more stable than a wheelbarrow. Jan prefers solid wheels to a trolley with inflatable tyres.

Jan's two favourite tools are her trolley and extension pole lopper. This is a light weight aluminium pole with a head that can cut through branches up to about 30mm diameter high up in the air. No need for a ladder and MUCH safer!The position of the head is adjustable.
