APS NSG President's report for 2019

2019 was my first year as your President and I was pleased to meet so many members at our activities. I am continually amazed at the number and diversity of activities that our group offers and even more amazed at the hard work and dedication shown by those members who organise and lead these activities.

Our monthly meetings were well attended with the interactive plant identification and propagation workshops of particular interest to members. As always, we were pleased to see visitors at our meetings, a sure sign of our successful publicity.

Our Walks and Talks Programme, in its shorter form, offered five walks and 16 walks and talks to members and visitors. The edible native food walk and Eucalypts walk and talk were very popular, with more than 40 people attending.

During 2019 we visited gardens in West Pymble, Westleigh and Bayview. All were truly inspiring and reflected their owners' ways of growing native plants and their native plant successes.

We had a very busy year propagating and buying plants for sale at our meetings, two APS NSW gatherings (one hosted by us at KWG), Seniors week stalls at St Ives and Hornsby, and our major fundraiser of the year, the Ku-ring-gai Wildflower Art and Garden Festival. With a sunny sky and widespread advertising by Ku-ring-gai Council, thousands of people came out for the festival and our plant and flower salespeople were extremely busy! Our working bee at our KWG shade house was also very successful with lots of drainage pipe laid.

We celebrated the endorsement of our Immediate Past President Barry Lees as a life member of APS NSW in May and mourned the passing of our former President and Festival and Christmas party coordinator, Carol Nolder, in July.

We awarded our Val Williams scholarship in March and then reviewed the candidate selection process to ensure its continuing appropriateness.

A small group of members attended the ANPS (Australia) National Conference in Albany, Western Australia in late September and our group was asked to assist with the planning and running of pre and post conference tours for the 2021 Conference in Kiama.

For our Christmas party, everyone had to bring a plant-themed, \$10 gift for someone else, for Santa to distribute. What amazing imaginations people showed! I was so impressed!!

Finally, my sincere thanks to everyone who helped to make all our activities so successful. I also thank everyone who contributed to our raffles, the proceeds of which went to the Royal Botanic Gardens No Plants No Future project.

APSNSG Treasurer's Report for 2019

In 2019, the North Shore Group had income of \$17,966 and expenditure of \$12,947 resulting in a net profit of \$5018, higher than the \$2878 profit in 2018. The total value of our bank and investment accounts at the end of 2019 was \$90,094, an increase of 5% on 2018.

Our major fundraising event, at the Wildflower, Art and Garden Festival at the end of August was very successful. We had \$8637 in takings, plus \$265 raffle takings and a \$310 in resulting from the sale of greeting cards. Festival expenses were \$4013 (excluding routine propagation expenses), resulting in a net profit of \$4624 on plant and flower sales.

Net membership revenues were \$1160, slightly higher than last year. Most memberships are now paid through the APS NSW website and the North Shore Group receives \$10 per membership.

We held plant stalls at two APS NSW regional get-togethers that yielded \$1298.

Walks and Talks entry grossed \$1068, significantly higher than last year. There were no plant sales at Walks and Talks.

Plant sales at monthly meetings yielded \$1732, slightly more than the 2018 takings of \$1682.

Other significant income included:

This year a \$3000 scholarship was awarded for research into Australian native plants. The other major expenses included plants and propagation materials, maintenance of the shadehouse, library books, meeting supplies and donations.

Significant expenditure, excluding the Festival, included:

We have changed banks, closing all Commonwealth and Macquarie Bank accounts and transferring the balances to the Bendigo Bank. One of our two term deposits at the ME Bank was increased from \$20,000 to \$40,000, and a \$16,000 term deposit was established with the Bendigo Bank. \$26,539 was transferred from our working account to term deposits.

Impact of the recent fires on some areas of NSW National Parks

Below is some Information from National Parks Association about the impact of the fires on plant communities and threatened plant and animal species. Note that it was prepared before the information/data about the recent south coast and central coast areas was available. This is an information package from the NSW Department of Planning, Industry and Environment summarising the impact of fire on parks and threatened species. It includes a map showing the locations of the fires and provides an indication of the intensity of damage to vegetation.

WHAT CAN YOU DO TO HELP SOME OF THE PEOPLE AND AREAS AFFECTED BY THE FIRES?

Join the Group Trip away in October 2020 to Blackheath

A trip of 2-3 days away is in the preliminary stages of planning. Our times away together are always enjoyable botanically and socially too as we explore the native plant "hotspots" of the region where we stay. It was suggested that this year, we visit the Blue Mountains area which by October should be well on the way to bouncing back from the ravages of the recent fires that we have heard so much about. Parts of the mountains were subjected to such hot fires that nothing green remained and they now resemble a bare moonscape with just black tree trunks or shrub stalks remaining. Even recently, however, just three weeks after the fires, I saw the first couple of centimetres of glossy leaves of epicormic growths coming from Eucalypt trunks, a couple of centimetres also of green at the base of the black Xanthorrohea spikes and a few stalks of green grasses emerging from the black soil. The rain that has followed will speed the regenerating process up no doubt. Yet, there are many questions that will only be answered with time. For example, how will the hanging swamps, the cliff faces, the Mt Tomah Botanic Gardens burnt sections recover? Many of these areas are currently still closed to the visiting public as inspections for dangerous trees etc are being carried out and acted on.

This trip is being organised by Sue Fredrickson who often visits the Blue Mountains, Blackheath in particular, for family reasons. She will monitor the fire recovery over the months between now and October and decide the most interesting parts for our group to visit. It is still to be decided whether the trip days will be over a weekend or during the week. Accommodation will be easier and there will be less visitors during the week and in that case the most suitable dates <u>probably start from the 12th October</u> hence avoiding the school holidays too.

It is most likely that we will make the Blackheath Glen Tourist Park our base. It has nicely located cabins and a covered communal bbq area. Believe it or not, the cabins are already being booked by others for October and we should really get onto the bookings.

Speaker: Simon Leake



Topic: The soils and vegetation of Barangaroo Headland Park

Background: Simon will describe how the soil and vegetation associations were developed matching soil type and landscape position to vegetation type resulting in the highly successful naturalistic landscape you now see at Barangaroo. For this project, commonly available recycled inorganic resources (crushed sandstone and recycled sand from building excavation) were combined with composted wood mulch screened from green garden waste collections and used to recreate a three-tiered replacement soil landscape for Barangaroo. The mulch layer or "O" (for organic) horizon would be analogous to the forest litter layer; the topsoil or A horizon, a well-drained sandy soil containing nutrients, organic matter and biological life and the Subsoil or B horizon, a well-drained water holding layer for root anchorage and moisture reserve.

Soil fertility levels were established using the "ash bed" principle where the initial soil fertility was established based on what the soil nutrient levels would be after a fire occurs to result in a soil fertility level that allows the vegetation to develop properly.

Simon is a soil scientist extraordinaire who leads a team with extensive achievements in rehabilitation, reconstruction and renewal of diverse urban projects and mine sites.
