2020 VAL WILLIAMS SCHOLARSHIP

The High Quality of Applications

Reading the eight proposals submitted for the Val Williams Scholarship this year was quite an education. I echo the words of the Head of the Committee in saying "...most of them were of a very high quality. Consequently, it was very difficult to separate the top candidates."

The committee report continues, "We awarded the Val Williams scholarship for 2020 to **Shubham Chhajed**, a PhD candidate at Macquarie University under the supervision of Professor Ian Wright. The title of his PhD research is, '*Hydraulic drivers of photosynthetic variation in co-occurring plant species in Sydney region: a least-cost theory approach*'. Plants need to photosynthesise efficiently to grow and be healthy and to do this they require access to carbon dioxide and water. During periods of water stress there are trade-offs in obtaining CO₂ for photosynthesis and preventing excessive water loss. Shubham is investigating the photosynthetic variation among co-occurring species in relation to their hydraulic strategies on a range of native plants from the Sydney region by applying a new theoretical model to the problem. The money awarded to this student will pay for stable isotope analyses of foliar carbon which is needed to obtain reliable estimates of leaf gas exchange rates that is central to this study."

I want to acquaint you with the research proposed by the other candidates too.

One project is investigating which plant species support pollinator health when resources are scarce so that key species with high visitation rates are identified. Another is focused on how the plant traits of street trees are linked with their functional diversity^{*}. From this proposal I learned that to encourage biodiversity in our urban environment, the ratio of species:genus:family should ideally be 10:20:30 with a maximum of 10% of one species in a suburb.

Unsurprisingly, the effects of fire and drought were a big concern for our young botanists. It seems that pyrogenic flowering** is associated with plants that have transient seed banks like Waratah, Gymea Lily and Blandfordia. Without canopy or persistent soil seed banks these species' reproductive effort is affected by changing fire seasonality. One of the applicants aims to focus on *Doryanthes excelsa* (Gymea Lily) to elucidate the mechanisms of fire and fire season on its seed biology.

Another applicant explained that the endangered *Persoonia hirsuta* (pictured) lacks proteoid cluster roots which assist in the uptake of water and nutrients, particularly phosphorus. She wants to know if fire might modify soil properties and thereby mitigate the effects of dieback that currently threatens to wipe out this beautiful Geebung.

Still another will address the effect of fire seasonality on post-dispersal seed predation. Here, the focus is on "serotinous species" which retain their seeds in the canopy and release them after fire.

A different project aims to quantify mortality and evaluate recovery of species in various biomes by measuring the loss of hydraulic conductivity in the conductive tissue of native tress and shrubs. Similarly, another student wishes to study the productivity and water-use strategies of liana vines in response to elevated carbon dioxide across dry and wet periods.

We can look forward to hearing the 2019 winner, Farhad Masoomi-Aladizgeh discuss his research findings later this year. Our members can be proud that our fund-raising activities contribute to this worthwhile scholarship fund. The quality of the applications shows how much our financial assistance is valued.

CONGRATULATIONS

On Wednesday 22nd April, Wendy Grimm's hard work and research on the orchid species *Genoplesium baueri* was acknowledged and rewarded! Wendy was awarded a Master of Philosophy Degree by Macquarie University.

To quote a Macquarie University Abstract of a talk she gave there: "The aim of this research was to examine the demographics and biology of *Genoplesium baueri* R.Br., an endangered terrestrial orchid species endemic to the Sydney Basin, New South Wales. This was done by carrying out a systematic study (2009-2018) of all individual plants in two key northern *G. baueri* populations. The number and variation in population and plant size; reproductive effort; timing of population emergence and field mortality were studied. These results and natural history observations were used to construct a diagram of the above- and below-ground stages of the proposed lifecycle of plant development and mortality of *G. baueri*."

Had it been more normal times, Wendy would have been attending her graduation ceremony on the 22nd April at Macquarie University and receiving her award. Instead, she had to be content to have it delivered to her home. That, however does not detract from the important findings of her work.

Bushwalking in times of Covid 19 Pandemic Sue Fredrickson



Hopefully the North Shore Group members are keeping safe and sane in the safety of our homes. As you know, our monthly group bushwalks can't be held in these times of social distancing. We are however legally allowed out for exercise in family groups with whom we share our house, in pairs or alone. Most of us have no doubt noticed how much more walking is taking place as people realise what a boost to the mood it is, on top of the obvious physical health benefits which are well known.

At this time especially, you are very lucky if you have

access to local bush with good tracks along which to get the exercise and to also enjoy the beauty of the bush. I am finding I am appreciating these opportunities even more than ever at present and have become more observant and awe-inspired in the bush. Most of our members reside in either Ku-ring-gai or Hornsby Shires, both of these areas being blessed with big areas of National Park and bush reserves.

The milder temperatures of autumn and the lower angle of the sun help to make it a very pleasant time of year to bushwalk, including lovely light effects. We have had a lot of perfect days weatherwise too. There is plenty of flowering going on locally and lately in the bush- the Banksias are about to be at their best, *Crowea saligna, Epacris pulchella, Bossiaea heterophylla* and *Persoonia pinifolia*, for example, all provide splashes of colour and autumn is peak mushroom and fungus time. With the slowdown of our pace of life and the extra time it presents, why not photograph and identify the plants you see- consult Native Plants books or email photos to club friends who have good general local plant ID skills? That way, we all learn and reinforce our plant knowledge. Our Newsletter editor also welcomes contributions of interesting photos of bush or plants that you have taken.

Some tips for safe bushwalking, especially at this time:

* Whenever possible, walk with someone. Whether alone or accompanied, take a fully charged mobile phone and try to stick to tracks that have mobile phone reception in case help is needed. * Notify someone of where you plan to walk and when you plan to return and confirm your safe return with them ASAP.

* We may be inspired to take bushwalks along tracks that we are not used to, just for some variety for instance. That brings with it a slightly elevated risk of injury due to unpredicted extra challenge. Perhaps you have done a particular walk a long time ago and don't remember that you were younger then when you tackled it! Research the walk beforehand in books, on the internet or maybe by ringing a friend who is more familiar with it to get an idea of distance and climbs involved.

Exhaustion can make us more prone to slips and falls and it is not a good time to have to get taken off to a hospital!

* Snakes may still be about while there is warm weather. It's always good to carry a wide, elasticised compression bandage, just in case.
* Take plenty of water with you. Take food too to keep up your energy levels and in case of emergency. A warm, and preferably wind proof, jacket is a good idea as the weather is becoming cooler.
* As always, keep to the track, wear sturdy shoes and take care.
